Last week, we held a beautiful **solemnity to celebrate All Saints' Day** on November 1<sup>st</sup>, 2024, in the Sports Hall. On Thursday, October 31<sup>st</sup>, we also held a **voluntary lunchtime rosary session** led by a local parish member from St. Ann's Church in Heald Green. It was heart warming to see so many children in attendance, engaging in prayer and reflection. **Each participant received a set of rosary beads**, which served as a meaningful token to mark the end of the Month of the Rosary. This gathering not only strengthened our sense of family but also deepened our appreciation for this Catholic tradition. This week, our Gospel reading and school Celebration of the Word is **Mark 12:28-34.** In this passage, a teacher of the law asks Jesus about the greatest commandment. Jesus responds by emphasising love—love for God and love for one's neighbour. **This timeless message of love and respect** for one another is particularly poignant as we approach Remembrance Day next week, a time when we honour those who sacrificed their lives for our freedom and dignity.

This Gospel teaches us the significance of compassion and perseverance in our relationships, reminding us that we should not shy away from expressing our faith and support for others. As we reflect on the sacrifices made by many, we are called to embody the love Jesus speaks of, ensuring that we recognise the inherent dignity in every person. Like the heroes and the fallen that we remember next week, we are encouraged to live with courage and a commitment to serve our community with kindness. In honouring their legacy, let us strive to follow the commandment of love, growing in faith and compassion towards all.

In connection with this week's focus on the **Catholic Social Teaching** principle of **Dignity** of the Human Person, we encourage our children to embrace the importance of respecting and valuing everyone in our community. This week, we invite students to practise this foundational principle at school and at home by showing kindness and support to their peers at school and family members. Simple acts like helping a friend with their work, listening to someone who needs to talk, or participating in class discussions can make a big difference.

We are currently planning some exciting **fundraising events for Caritas**- a Diocesan supported charity. The mission of Caritas is rooted in our Catholic faith, which calls us to love our neighbours and put faith in action through love/caritas. Bishop Mark has asked all local Catholic schools to support this worthy cause.
